## Ted Hornback

Coach Ted Hornback graduated from Western Kentucky State Teachers' College in 1929 and came to Corinth to teach and coach in the fall of that year. As a star forward for the Western Kentucky Hilltoppers, he had been coached by the famous Ed Diddle, and at the finals of the state tournament in the spring of 1930, Ed Diddle was present to witness Ted's success with his first coaching job.

To give his team experience against tough competition, Mr. Hornback scheduled games against some outstanding teams of larger schools. The squad made one road trip to Western Kentucky, where they played several games, including one with the Western College Freshmen.

On the warpath in 1929-30, Corinth engaged various palefaces in 42 minor skirmishes or major battles and collected 35 scalps.

From Corinth, Ted Hornback went to Ludlow High School as coach, and from Ludlow to Bowling Green, where he coached the Western Kentucky College Freshmen before he became the Athletic Director.

## "Prof" Whalin

E.B. Whalin, age 26, arrived in Corinth in the fall of 1926 with his wife Lula Belle and their six weeks old son Wallace Eugene.

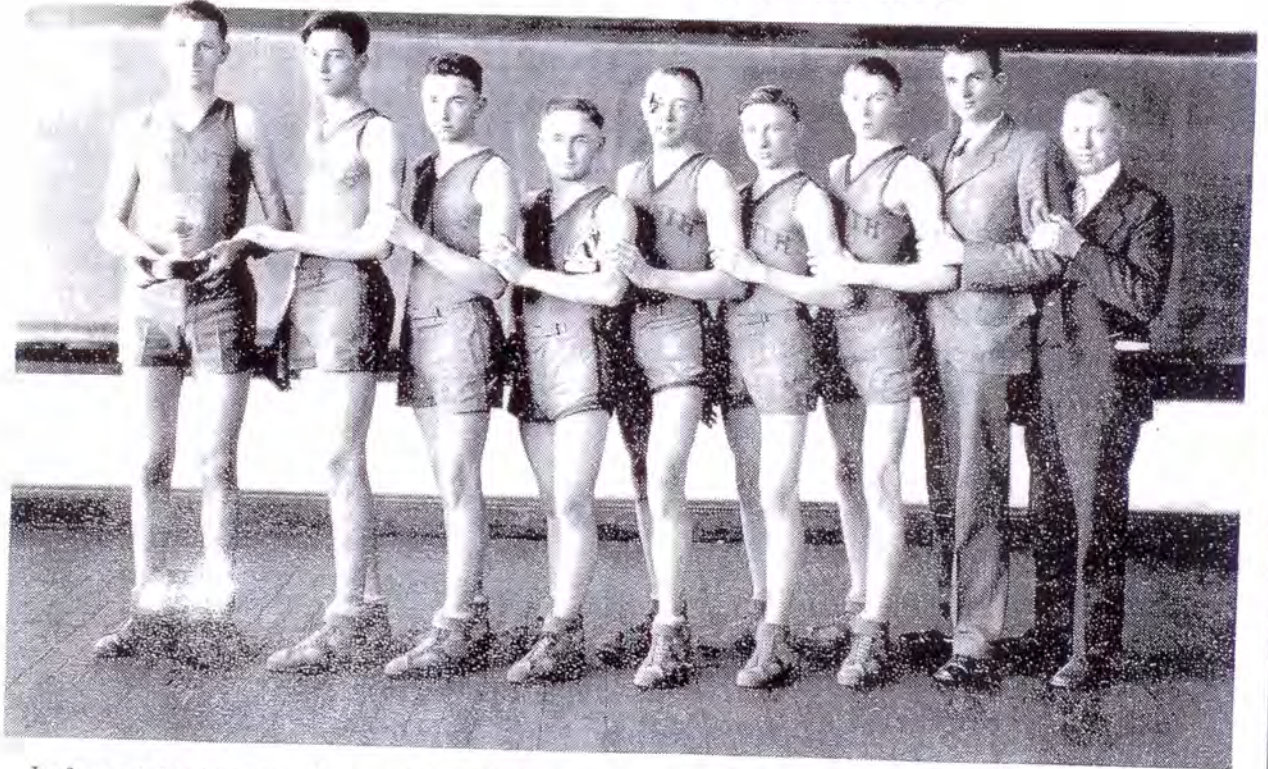
"Prof," as he was affectionately called, gave his full support to the Corinth school and its activities. He supported the ball team one hundred per cent, and when Corinth won the state championship in 1930, he had missed only one game in four years.

A graduate of Western Kentucky Teachers' College, now Western Kentucky State University, he was joined on the high school faculty by other teachers from Western: L.B. Woosley in 1927, Ted Hornback and Kathryn Melton in 1929. He also influenced several Corinth graduates to attend college at Western Kentucky.



The story of the 1930 Championship team actually began with the 1929 team, coached by L.B. Woosley. With the exception of Hubert Odor, all the players were members of the 1930 team.

#### L.B. Woosley

L.B. Woosley, also from Western Kentucky, coached the Corinth High School basketball team in 1927-28 and 1928-29. In 1929, his team was runner-up in the State Tournament.

The first five players on the 1930 team had been regulars in 1929 and had gained valuable experience in playing under tournament pressure.

Mr. Woosley, who stressed physical fitness and imposed strict discipline, preferred to schedule games against strong teams. One of his favorite slogans was "Brave men are weakened by victory rather than by defeat."

In 1930, while elated over the championship, the fans never forgot the part played by L.B. Woosley in the development of the champions.

In 1955, at the Anniversary dinner, Ted Hornback spoke of his "debt of gratitude to L.B. Woosley who laid the foundation for a winning team."



**"CORINTH HAS WON ! CORINTH HAS WON ! CORINTH HAS WON THE STATE TOURNAMENT !"**

That was the exciting cry of Corinth fans after the championship game Saturday night, March 22, 1930. Although telephones were almost nonexistent in the Corinth vicinity at that time, the news traveled swiftly.

When Tom Simons returned from Lexington, he made a Midnight Ride to the house called the old Simons Place to inform the parents of Dave and Bear Lawrence.

Yes, Corinth had won the state tournament in what Neville Dunn, Sports Editor of The Lexington Leader called "PROBABLY THE MOST AMAZING FINISH EVER MADE IN A HIGH SCHOOL BASKETBALL GAME IN Kentucky."

With only one minute and forty-five seconds left to play, Corinth was trailing by four points, 20-16. In those days, four points was a big lead. Sometimes a team did not score four points in an entire quarter. The game was not the swift moving sport that it is today. Players concentrated on defense, and after each goal, both teams went to the center circle to jump again.

The Tall Pines of Kavanaugh had led all during the game; with less than two minutes to play, many fans had already started to leave. They thought the game was over, but the Braves did not.

Left-handed Rogers made a hook shot-then back they went to the center. Wilbur Odor managed to out jump his taller opponent and got the tip to Rogers, who immediately scored again. Now the game was tied at 20-20, and the crowd began pulling for the underdog.

With only a few seconds left, Kavanaugh got the tip but lost the ball out of bounds. A Corinth player tossed in the ball to Jones, who made the winning shot and became the high point man of the final game with seven points.

(Fifty years later, the people who saw that game still talk about the excitement and the reaction of some of the fans. One story is that John Juett, who lived at Corinth at that time, threw down his expensive made-to-order hat and jumped up and down on it.)

When the trophies were awarded, William Howard Jones was given the basketball with which he made the winning shot. The team, led by Captain Bear Lawrence, received not only the Championship trophy, but also the Sportsmanship Cup. Each player was given a miniature gold basketball, and Ted Hornback received a silver regulation size basketball for coaching the championship team.

### **Make Amazing Finish**

*They Shot Three Field Goals in Little More Than a Minute to Conquer Kavanaugh Quintet 22 to 20; Woodburn Lassies Lose, 23 to 18*

#### **ROGERS AND JONES SHOOT THE WINNING POINTS FOR B CHAMPS**

*and Then Their Team Carries Off Sportsmanship Trophy As Well; Class A Comes Through in the Girls Division*



Probably the most amazing finish ever made in a high school basket ball game in Kentucky was pulled by Corinth, Class B champion, in defeating Kavanaugh, the Class A representative, 22 to 20, Saturday night in the finals of the 12th annual Kentucky State tournament.

In just a fraction more than a minute before the final gun, Corinth shot three field goals to transform what seemed to be certain defeat into a glorious triumph. And in making those three field goals within a space of time that astounds one because it seems impossible, Corinth tried just three shots—just three.

Prior to this spectacular climax to one of the most successful tournaments sponsored for the high school teams the breadth and length of the State by the University of Kentucky, the Hazard girls ran true to form by bringing home the feminine championship to the Class A division. They conquered a scrappy quintet of misses from Woodburn, a small town near Bowling Green, 23 to 18.

But as exciting as the girls' encounter was—the lead see-sawed all the way—the crowd of approximately 4,500 fans who witnessed the final contest for the twin championships, forgot its thrills in the tumult of the Corinth-Kavanaugh battle. They were dazed, as a matter of fact, when that winning shot sank through the net but the pause was almost too slight to be noticed. And then what a roar!

#### Two Are Heroes

Two youngsters today know how it feels to be heroes. Roscoe Rogers and William Howard Jones are the marvels who fired the shots that rocked Kentucky basket ball. Rogers made two of the three—the first two that tied the score—and Jones shot the third that won the game. Rogers is a southpaw who gets in the center hole on the offense and his first heave was made on a left-handed hook delivery. The ball rolled right over the edge of the hoop almost on a straight line. There were about a minute and 15 seconds of time remaining and Kavanaugh was on top 20 to 16 when Rogers sank that goal.

Odor, Corinth's center, probably never stretched more in his life than he did on the next tip-off and he got an even break with James Houchin, Kavanaugh pivot man, who had been outjumping him all evening. The ball fell into Rogers' hands, he turned and shot—releasing the ball before his eyes had time to focus on the basket—and the ball went through without touching anything but the net. That tied the score at 20 to 20 and only 40 seconds or so remained.

#### Fought Like Demons

Corinth was fighting like a demon then and the crowd yelled its approval in a roar that shook the gym. Kavanaugh got the ball but lost it out of bounds. A Corinth player tossed it to Jones, he dribbled once, gathered the ball into his arms and shot. The sphere hit the center of the basket squarely. The most amazing game in the history of the Kentucky State tournament was over.

Kavanaugh looked as if it were a sure winner all the way through until that last minute and 15 seconds. It started with such a rush, it was on top 6 to 0 at the end of the first quarter and it broke through with goals thenceforth every time Corinth threatened. In the third quarter, Corinth overcame the 8 to 3 lead Kavanaugh enjoyed at the half and went to the front 12 to 10 by making nine points in rapid succession. But Kavanaugh let out another notch, so it seemed, and was out in front again. It remained there, 20 to 16, until Rogers and Jones took their sudden notion to go into a scoring frenzy.

### SPORTSMANSHIP CUP WON BY CORINTH TOO

In addition to carrying off the handsome silver trophy that designated them as the 1930 champion boys' team of Kentucky, the Corinth boys were awarded the trophy given annually by the State Y. M. C. A. for the best sportsmanship displayed in the State basket ball tournament.

The trophy, as well as the other awards, was presented to Captain Frank Lawrence, of Corinth, by Prof. Ralph Hill, secretary of the Kentucky High School Athletic Association right after Corinth defeated Kavanaugh for the State title.

## WINS CHAMPIONSHIP

### GAME AT LEXINGTON

#### Rated As "Dark Horse," They Come From Behind In Final Period To Defeat Kavanaugh By Score Of 22 To 20

Corinth people turned out in large numbers, and many basketball fans from all parts of the county went to Lexington Saturday night to root for the Grant county team. Their efforts were not in vain. Kavanaugh took the lead in the first period and was ahead until the game seemed practically won. But Corinth staged a last minute rally and nosed out the strong Kavanaugh team by a score of 22 to 20.

Corinth, Ky., March 23—All Corinth stood in front of the Post Office today, pointing with beaming pride to a shining silver basketball, with its miniature basket ball player crouched on top, on display in the window.

A stranger couldn't have been in this little Grant county town of 400 souls for more than five minutes today without having been led to the window and shown what sight of the town's boys and their coach had brought home with them from Lexington early this morning.

That big silver basket ball belongs to Corinth High School's Braves, victors in last night's contest with Kavanaugh High of Lawrenceburg for the state title.

And that wasn't all the boys brought home with them. On one side of the championship trophy in the window is the tourney

sportsmanship cup—on the other the University of Kentucky's trophy for the tourney's best coach. And then each one of the squad is wearing a gold basket ball.

It was the most dramatic and sensational finish that has ever been staged in the final game of the state tournament in the 12 years of its history, and left a crowd of 5,000 people stark mad, waving their hats, screaming and fighting to congratulate the winners.

Corinth forever will cherish the memory of a slim youth named Rogers, who shot two field goals in less than 10 seconds time to overcome a 20 to 16 lead which Kavanaugh had amassed, and tie the score at 20-all. And Corinth should erect a monument to Jones whose magic touch resulted in two more points for the brave Braves with only a few second to play.



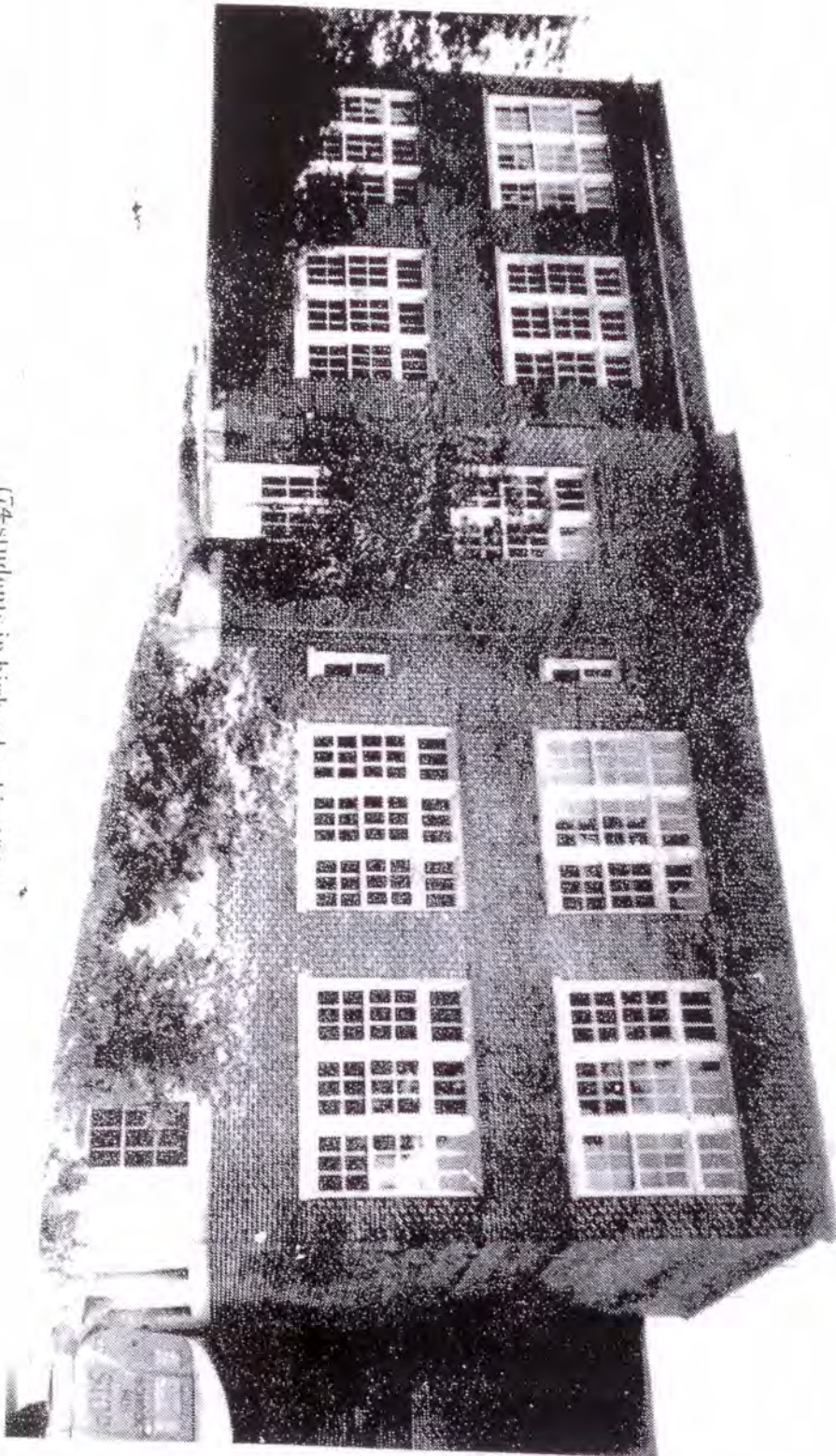

## Corinth Will Play in National Tourney Coach Hornback Says

Before the 250 inhabitants of Corinth and vicinity were back to normal, the Braves were invited to play in the Twelfth National Basketball Tournament in Chicago-April 1-5.

Immediately a group of fans began the task of soliciting (or donating) funds to send the state champions to Chicago. A complete list of the men who took on the responsibility is not available, but the list would include Tom Simons, Elmer Alcoke, Kenneth Childers, Harry Bailey, John Juett, Frank Craig, and Audrey Rogers, who had driven from Detroit for the state tournament.

Several members of the same group had furnished cars and served as drivers for both girls and boys' teams throughout the season. Elmer Alcoke had even loaned his new Chrysler for the road trip to Western Kentucky.

Barely a week lay between the team's return from Lexington and their departure for Chicago, but by the end of the week, the fund-raisers had collected more than five hundred dollars. Prof. Whalin decided that the amount was sufficient to take along George Hayden as tenth man. George and Hugh McClintock had alternated in going to the previous tournament games, and it was George's turn to be left behind. George was informed of his good fortune, and Mr. Whalin remarked, "Today there are two happy boys in Corinth and both of them are George Hayden."



During the week after the state tournament, the fans discussed or replayed the games that led up to the final frenzy. There was the game with Carr Creek that no one except the Corinth fans expected the Braves to win; there was the semi-final game with Tolu in which Corinth had come from behind to win by one point, but one game that cannot be left out of the 1930 championship story is the game with the Walton Bearcats in the semi-finals of the regional tournament at Paris.

Walton had clobbered Corinth twice during the year. Their players were good shots, especially Jimmy Vest and the tall "Frenchy" Demoisey, who later played for Adolph Rupp at U.K. Everybody knew that Walton was THE OBSTACLE between Corinth and the state tournament.



(Note: In 1929, 1930, and later, Kentucky schools were classed as A or B according to size and enrollment. A and B schools were placed in separate tournament brackets and met only in the finals of the district, region, or state. The runner-up in the district participated in the regional, and the runner-up in the regional also went to the state. The game with Walton was extremely important because that was the game that determined whether Walton or Corinth would go to the state, no matter who won the finals.)

Prof. Whalin bought green paint and sent a student to paint the words "Go To Paris and Help Beat Walton" in numerous places on the sidewalk in Corinth. "Go to Paris and Help Beat Walton" became the war cry, and the tribe responded. Not many people were left in Corinth the Saturday afternoon of the Walton - Corinth game.

Coach Hornback, knowing that the Braves could not outrun or outshoot the Walton Bearcats, planned his strategy with care. He stressed possession of the ball and no wasted shots. Whenever a Corinth player managed to get the ball, he hung on to it or made sure passes until a teammate was open under the basket. The strategy worked. At the end of the first quarter, the score was 10-2 in favor of Corinth, and the Walton team was already rattled. Corinth was leading at the half, at the third quarter, and at the end, 16-14.

That loss was a bitter blow to Walton, and a few weeks later, when the Corinth fans put up the sign "Home of the 1930 Kentucky State Basketball Champions," Walton put up a sign "Don't Mention Basketball In This Town."

Accompanied by Coach Hornback and Prof. E.B. Whalin, the Braves left Corinth before daylight Sunday morning, March 30, 1930, and traveled to Chicago on a Greyhound bus.

They arrived in Chicago that night and stayed at the Windermere Hotel. Many fans followed in cars, and others went to Chicago during the week as the team continued to win.

A complete list of those who went to Chicago for all or part of the games was not available, but the list would include the following; Mr. and Mrs. P.L. # **Corinth Scores 24-15 Over Northwestern**

## **GAME I**

In the original tournament drawing, Corinth had been paired with St. John's Military Academy for one o'clock Wednesday afternoon, but when Caspar, Wyoming, wired that they could not get to Chicago in time to play Northwestern Military Academy, Lake Geneva, the tournament decided that Corinth should take Caspar's place. The decision caused Corinth to play an extra game in the tournament and was the only winning team who did not get a day of rest.

Northwestern had lost only one game out of twenty during the season, but Corinth defeated them by a score of 24-15.

Roscoe Rogers and Dave Lawrence tied for high point man with nine points each.

CHICAGO, April 2.—Coach  
Teddy Hornback's Corinth  
High school Braves staged one  
of the biggest upsets of the  
1930 national high school bas-  
ketball tournament in the last  
game here tonight by eliminat-  
ing the heavily favored Chi-  
nook, Mont., outfit by a count  
of 35 to 20.

With Corinth trailing, 10 to 4, at  
the end of the first quarter, the  
game was changed from what at  
first seemed to be an easy win for  
Montana to an overwhelming vic-  
tory for the Kentuckians. Creeping  
ahead at the half, 14 to 13, Corinth  
took a comfortable lead in the third  
quarter and won eased up.

It was the first defeat of the sea-  
son for the Chinook lads, who had  
won 31 straight games previous to  
tonight, during which time they  
scored 1145 points to 496 for the op-  
position.

Chinook's boast was that it had  
not participated in a close game this  
year, and it can still make that  
boast, for Corinth ran wild as soon  
as the boys got settled down after  
a poor start.

The victory sent the Kentuckians  
into the third round, and gave the  
Blue Grass state two representa-  
tives still in the running, as Kav-  
anaugh High of Lawrenceburg de-  
feated Waterloo, N. Y., 26 to 12, in  
a second round game this morning.

Corinth will meet the Linsly In-  
stitute team, from Wheeling, W.  
Va., Thursday night at 8 o'clock.  
Linsly has one of the biggest and  
fastest teams in the tournament,  
having won two impressive vic-  
tories over Reagan High, of Hous-  
ton, Texas, 33 to 20, and Spartan-  
burg, S. C., 25 to 22. Linsly, like  
Chinook, has not been defeated  
this year.

Kavanaugh plays Braselton,  
Ga., Thursday morning at 9  
o'clock, and will again be the un-  
derdog.

The next pin to fall was Linsly Institute of Wheeling, West Virginia. Like Chinook, Montana, Linsly had not lost a single game during the current season and had lost only four games in the past ten years. The game ended 35-25 in favor of Corinth.

## Corinth Wins

### GAINS FAVOR BY DEFEATING WEST VIRGINIANS, 35-25

Dave Lawrence Leads Comeback Attack Which Results in Downfall of Hitherto Unbeaten Team

KAVANAUGH IS DEFEATED BY BRASELTON, GA., 29-26

Corinth Will Play Savannah, Ga., This Afternoon at 3 o'Clock

CHICAGO, April 3.—Those doubting Thomases who didn't think Corinth High school was a capable team to represent Kentucky in the national tournament should have seen Coach Teddy Hornback's Braves tonight. The boys from Grant county looked like a million

dollars in eliminating the Linsly Institute team, of Wheeling, W. Va., 35 to 25, in the third round of the national meet now in progress at Bartlett gymnasium.

Overcoming an early Linsly lead, the Braves tomahawked their way to a 16 to 13 advantage at the half, increased the lead to 21 to 14 in the third quarter, and pulled away easily in the final period. Eleven of Linsly's points were scored late in the last quarter after the Braves had assumed an insurmountable 31 to 14 lead.

Dave Lawrence, Corinth's demon all-around star, showed the way with 11 points tonight, in addition to playing a great defensive and floor game. Corinth used a substitute for the first time, True being sent into the game in the third and last quarters. He tallied twice from the field and handled himself well.

Eight teams are still in the running following today's games. In the bracket with Corinth are Savannah, Ga., New Brunswick, N. J., and Jena, La. In the lower bracket are Athens, Texas, defending champions; Braselton, Ga., conqueror of Kavanaugh; St. John's Military Academy, of Delafield, Wis., and Wheatland, Wyo.

## GAME IV

Friday afternoon, April 4, Corinth's opponent was Savannah, Georgia, the team that had eliminated Kavanaugh in Kavanaugh's third round. The Braves had become a favorite with the tournament crowd, and many added their support to that of Grant County fans.

In the Savannah game, neither team scored during the first four minutes, and the first quarter ended 3-2. In the second quarter, Rogers, Jones, Dave Lawrence, and Odor all scored, and Bear Lawrence made one of his favorite long shots.

In the beginning of the last quarter, Rogers, Odor, and Dave Lawrence scored before Savannah made a single point. The final score was Corinth 26, Savannah 14. D. Lawrence and Rogers scored 8 points each.

Edwin Ashford, reporter for the Lexington Herald wrote that Corinth fans were beginning to wonder how good their team really was.

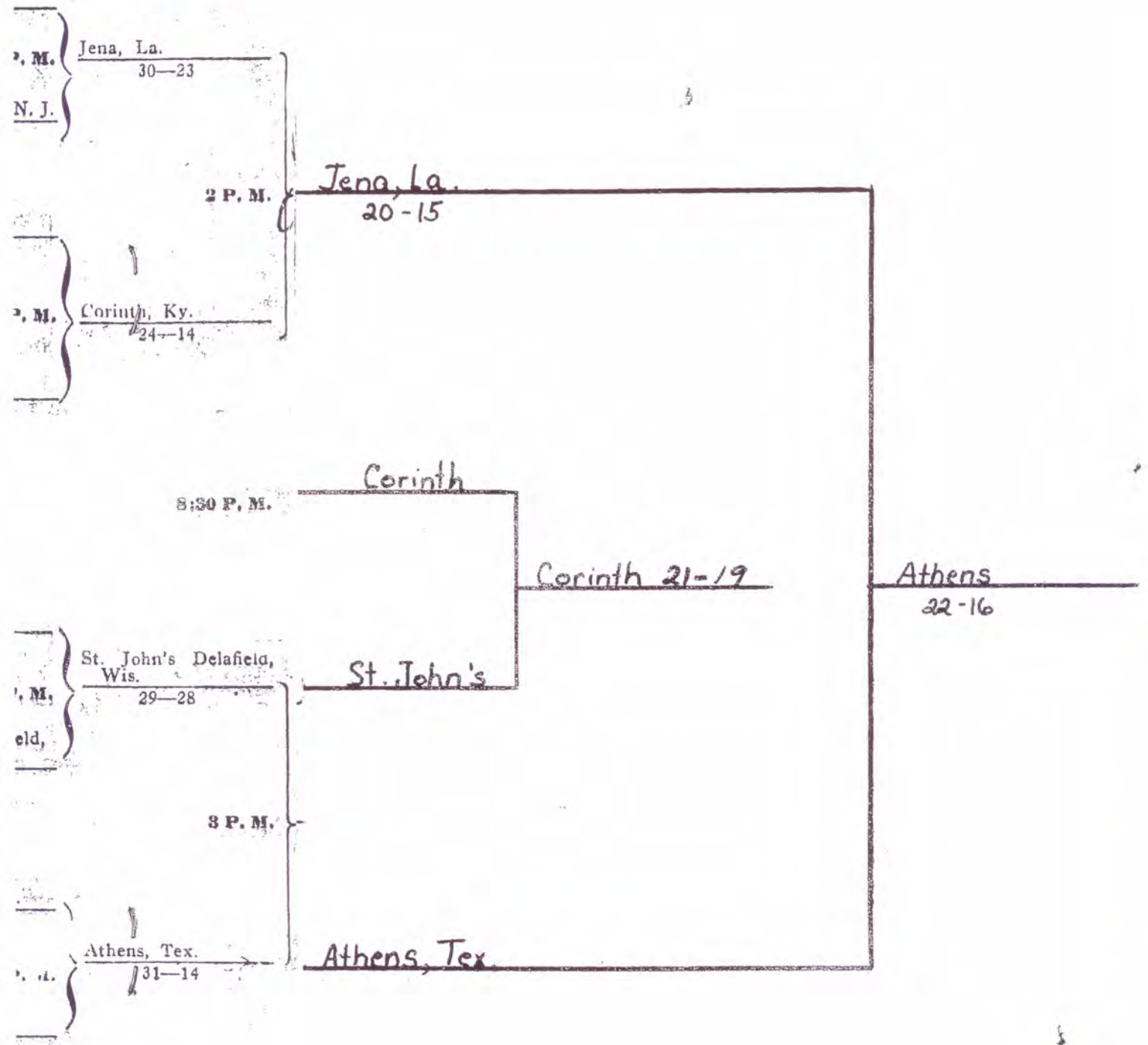

# KENTUCKIANS GEORGIA CHAMPS, 26-14, IN NATIONAL MEET

**Kentuckians Have Good Chance  
to Defeat Jena, La., in Fight  
for Right to Enter  
Finals Tonight.**

**TWO TEAMS WILL MEET AT  
2 O'CLOCK THIS AFTERNOON**

**Dave Lawrence Is Hero Again;  
Rogers, Jones Suffer Slight  
Injuries**

CHICAGO, April 4—Page Ripley—here's one for the book. Those Corinth High school Braves, who didn't win their district or regional championships back in Kentucky, and captured state tournament honors by the closest of margins in the recent state meet at Lexington, are sitting on top of the world right now after their fourth straight easy victory in the national interscholastic basketball tournament now in progress at Bartlett gymnasium here.

Kentuckians in Chicago are wondering just how good Coach Teddy Hornback's team really is, following the Braves' 26 to 14 win over the Savannah, Ga., team in the quarter-final round this afternoon. The victory sent the Kentuckians into the semi-finals and assured the Blue Grass state of at least fourth place in national ranking.

the Braves will take the court against the Jena, La., team which downed New Brunswick, N. J., without much trouble this afternoon, 30 to 28. If victorious, the Braves will go into the finals against the winner of the other semi-final game tonight, but even if they lose, the Corinth boys will not yet be through with basketball. Saturday night, just previous to the final game, the two semi-final losers will battle for the third place trophy.

**Kentuckians Tired After Game**

The Kentuckians were a little tired following today's victory. Rogers and Jones are suffering with slight injuries, but if they can get a good rest tonight should be in fair condition for the battle with Jena. Jena, like Corinth, has had easy sailing so far in the meet, having won three games by impressive margins.

Corinth is the only team left in the meet that has had to play every day, all the remaining five having enjoyed at least one day's rest.

Corinth's wins have been over the Northwestern Military and Naval Academy of Lake Geneva, Wis., 24 to 15; Chinook, undefeated champions of Montana, 35 to 20; Linsly Institute, hitherto unbeaten Wheeling, W. Va., champions, 35 to 25, and Savannah, Ga., Interscholastic Athletic Association title holders, 26 to 14. Jena's high-powered team has eliminated Clovis, N. M., 49 to 21; Lakeland, Fla., 41 to 15, and New Brunswick, N. J., 30 to 23. The Louisiana school has a big team composed of the most deadly shots of the tournament, and has averaged 40 points a game in the Staggs meet. Jena eliminated Heath, Corinth's predecessor, last year in the Chicago tournament, and has a much better team this season. In 1929 the Louisiana champions went to the quarter-finals, where they were eliminated by Joes, Colo., third place winners.

**Jena Called Giants**

The Giants, as the Jena team is called, had an average advantage of almost 20 points a game over their opponents in the Louisiana state meet. In the regular season Jena scored 853 points to 423 for the opposition, winning 21 straight

Corinth was the only team in the semi-finals that had played every day without a day of rest. The other three teams were playing their fourth game, but for Corinth, it was the fifth.

At the end of the first quarter, Corinth was leading 7-3; the teams were tied at the half; Corinth was trailing by a point at the end of the third quarter and by five points at the close of the game. They lost to the Jena Giants 20-15.

## GAME VI

Although they lost to Jena in the semi-finals, the Corinth Braves were not yet finished. They still had to compete with St. John's Military Academy for third place in the nation.

Battered, bruised, and blistered from five straight days on the warpath, the Braves still managed to collect one more scalp. The final score was 21-19.

In the first quarter of the game, Rogers made a hit with the fans by making a crip while completely surrounded by his opponents and by tossing in another goal soon afterward.

Dave Lawrence surprised the spectators in the third quarter by making an 80-foot shot without the ball touching the rim. A Louisville reporter called it "by far the most flabbergasting shot of the tournament."

### Dave Thrills Fans

But it remained for Dave Lawrence to thrill the fans like they had never been thrilled before. During the third frame Dave held the ball way down in his territory. He made a motion to shoot and the stands tittered. That must have irked him, for he waited a moment and did shoot. The ball soared down past the center of the floor, *was in the floodlights at the top of the gym and came down through the nets without touching them.* The shot was by far the most flabbergasting of the entire tournament.

That shot and his all-around work in all other games, his pointage, which is second only to one other lad in the meet, brought to Dave the honor of a forward position on the consensus All-American. His total points of the closing contest was nine.

Dave wasn't the only shining light however, for Mr. Jones, Capt. "Big Chief" Frank Lawrence, Roscoe Rogers and Wilbur Odor all performed with injuries, sore feet and aching muscles as if their lives depended on the outcome of the game.

The trophies have remained prized possessions of the Corinth Alumni Association for fifty years.






**CORINTH SCHOOL
